
Schwaner, Edward Schellhaas Albert Ott and Billy Hays will open in the Catholic backfield

## Split Duke Over Yama

MIAMI BEACH, (UP)-Gil Turner's unrelenting fists won him an upset split decision over Bimini's Yama Bahama in a 10round fight last night; but his manager ordered him to a hospital with a painful head injury which doctors said was not seri-

Turner, 26-year-old Philadelphian, suffered a torn vein un-der the skin of his forehead and a possible concussion while bat-tering through the defensive maneuvers of the swarthy Ba-hamian before 2068 fans at the Miami Beach Auditorium.

Turner, whose victory last night was sweet revenge for a loss to Bahama in Madison Square Garden last June, said he thought he received the head injury during the final three rounds "from butting."

"I guess I was trying to keep his head from butting me and he was doing the same thing, said Turner.

But Bahama, whose real name is William Butler, claimed "It must have been from those rights I hit him with. I got him some good ones."

The Bahamian's manager, Bobby Melnick, complained bitterly about the outcome of the fight. Judge Gus Jacobson and referee Cy Gottfried gave the decision to Turner while judge Stu Winton awarded it to Bahama.

Turner set the pattern of the bout in the first round when he roared from his corner throwing left jabs at Bahama and following them with right hooks,
